The NMOTA Board also wishes to acknowledge the contributions of Joanna Cosbey. Since 2019, Joanna has served as the Association's Vice President. One of her first initiatives was to modernize the Association's document storage in Google drive so that board members living in different corners of New Mexico could communicate and collaborate over a great distance. This proved invaluable during the first two years of the COVID Pandemic and has resulted in an orderly pass-down of information and duties for the members of the NMOTA Board. Joanna's organizational and leadership skills have bolstered the efforts of the Brews and CEUs conference in 2020, the virtual NMOTA Annual Conference in 2021, and our return to a live annual conference in 2022, in which Joanna was the Plenary speaker. Joanna has notified the Association that she will need to step down from the Board. The Executive Board will be actively recruiting an OT or OTA to train with her so that there can be as much pass down as possible for the duties of the Vice President for the person who is able to step into the role.

### **Executive Corner Continued**

Mary Thelander Hill has been the Treasurer since September 2018. Mary has served on the Executive Board since 2017, as the Secretary of the Association for one year prior to becoming Treasurer. In her time as Treasurer, Mary has automated the bookkeeping, streamlined payment systems, and ensured accurate and timely filing of NMOTA taxes. Prior to that time, Mary was a member of the Conference committee as the chair of the silent auction for five years and helped raise more than \$10,000 for the AOTF Occupational Therapy Scholarship Fund (with the generous donations of NMOTA OTs and OTAs and community businesses). Mary also supervised OT students in advocacy and service learning projects with the Association. After two terms as Treasurer, Mary is term-limited, but will be a resource to the newly elected Treasurer.



### **Practice Areas Interview**

The following is an interview from Denise Fajardo, a School-Based Occupational Therapist in Silver City, NM. She discusses Board Certification in Pediatrics (through AOTA's Advanced Certification Program) and what the process entails to obtain this certification.

#### What does BCP stand for?

• BCP stands for "Board Certified in Pediatrics".

Tell me about why you wanted to get the certification?

• I wanted to get board certified because I thought it would give me additional knowledge so I could provide more effective "evidence-based" Occupational Therapy interventions. Getting board certified also provides the therapist with a validation of skills/experience to enhance their ability to be heard or to advocate for the profession and clients. I was hoping the BCP would give my employer or future employer confidence in hiring me or giving me additional responsibilities to be an effective team member.

#### Is the certification through AOTA or NBCOT?

• The certification is through AOTA and the OT may need to be a member of AOTA. The website with details is listed here: <a href="https://www.aota.org/career/advanced-certification-program">https://www.aota.org/career/advanced-certification-program</a>

### What was the process?

• The process for me may be slightly different than now as I was one of the first cohorts to take the exam. For example, I took my exam in June, but did not get results until the following October because the team developing the exam/program had to gather the data from the exam. I also took a prep course that lasted for 6 months consisting of intensive online discussions and downloads/information.

The requirements for the Advanced Certification Exam are:

Be certified or licensed by, and in good standing, with an AOTA-recognized credentialing or regulatory body.

- 1. Have a minimum of 3 years experience as an OT
- 2. Have a minimum of 3000 hours of experience in the certification area within the last 5 years.
- 3. A minimum of 500 hours delivering OT services to clients in the certification areas within the last 5 years (this is to distinguish actual service time versus administration, etc in the certification area)
- 4. Verification of years of experience as an OT as well as years of experience within the practice area is required.
- 5. The steps to getting certified are:
  - a. Apply/submit application & await the review and approval of your application
  - b. Exam eligibility: You have 90 days from the approval of your application to schedule and take the exam.
  - c. The certification begins the day you pass the exam and lasts for 5 years.
  - d. You are required to earn at least 60 contact hours of professional development and maintain at least 1500 hours of experience in the certification area within your 5-year certification cycle.

### **Practice Areas Continued**

How do you think it will impact your practice?

• I had hoped the certification would give my employers the confidence they needed to allow me to take on more responsibilities, as well as playing a role with the current transition planning program at the high school, as well as updating the preschool/DD program to be based on best-practice and evidence-based approaches to therapy.

What challenges do you face in your practice? You are School-Based with Silver City Schools?

- I am school-based in Silver City, New Mexico. The challenges I face at my current practice location are numerous at this time, mostly due to post COVID restrictions.
- At this time my certification has had no impact on this job placement; however, I only recently achieved this certification (October 2021) and so I am hoping that my certification will open doors for me whether here in Silver City or elsewhere. This is a National certification and so I am hoping it will show that I have advanced skills in this practice area no matter where I am located.

# **Legislative Matters**

This year our committee has been keeping an eye on legislative matters concerning our profession here in New Mexico. You may have heard of the Occupational Therapy Interstate Compact these last couple of years. This is a compact to allow OT's and OTA's to practice across state lines and to not have to hold an individual state license within each state in which they work. So far, 20 states have signed into their legislation the Occupational Therapy Interstate Compact. New Mexico has not yet passed legislation to join the Interstate Compact.

This year our committee has been involved in a few meetings concerning a possible proposal to our legislators here in New Mexico. We have met with the American Occupational Therapy Association, the National Board of Certification for Occupational Therapy, and here within New Mexico, state level stakeholders to see if this is the year that we will try. The last meeting that our committee participated in was this past September, when other stakeholders such as the New Mexico Physical Therapy Association and the New Mexico Psychologists Association (they are both pursuing to pass their own interstate compacts) met to learn about each profession's circumstances regarding New Mexico as another "compact privilege" state. At that meeting, Linda Seigle, who serves as our lobbyist, had valuable insight. To share, it has been on the recommendation of the AOTA and NBCOT to not pursue our OT interstate compact. The past meeting that we attended - it was the consensus to not pursue our individual compacts as well. Why?

For a bill to be voted on, there is a "gatekeeper" within our state legislative process known as the Senate Judicial Committee. The current members of Senate Judicial Committee are very concerned with passing professional interstate compacts in general, such as our OT interstate Compact. The last interstate compact to be heard by the Senate Judicial Committee was the Physical Therapy Interstate Compact in 2021. It was first heard by the Senate Judicial Committee and was not passed on to have a vote in the Senate or House of Representatives. One example of why it was not passed is the concern of losing state sovereignty regarding licensure. The legislators that served on that committee in 2021 are projected to continue to serve here in 2023. Our state association has been advised to wait until the political climate changes and to direct our endeavors elsewhere. Unless there is a big change in the next couple of months, the New Mexico Occupational Therapy Association will be on standby concerning our progress with the Occupational Therapy Interstate Compact. The additional time will also allow opportunities to discover how joining the compact has affected the states who have been early adopters.

What is next? This year we plan to hold another Legislative Day at the State Capitol. The past two years we have held an online zoom venue and that has been successful. We look forward to an in-person event for practitioners and students of Occupational Therapy to be present at our state capitol of government to educate and advocate.

Legislative Day is confirmed for February 15th. Our theme this year is "Occupational Therapy Day at the Legislature" so that we can increase awareness of the distinct value of Occupational Therapy to our lawmakers. So... our mission on February 15th 2023: to share our passion for Occupational Therapy, why we are important in our community as a profession and that we do help increase the quality of life of each human that requires our unique skill. The occupation of life is sacred...we are the best advocates for OT.



### Treasurer's Account

The past several years have been difficult on all financials for the Association, but due to conservative financial practices by the NMOTA board for the past decades, we have had a sufficient nest egg to weather the storms of the pandemic years and the post-pandemic costs.

The chart below depicts the financial state of NMOTA at the end of the fiscal year from June 2019 through August 2022. NMOTA does not carry any debt (in credit card or other forms). In August 2022, NMOTA had \$67,816.42 in savings and \$57,304.43 in checking. The major expenses of the conference have not yet been deducted from the August balance.



# State-Level Changes to the Rules and Laws for Occupational Therapy

It is the responsibility of every Occupational Therapist (OT) and Occupational Therapy Assistant (OTA) to stay up-to-date on the rules and laws of Occupational Therapy. Those rules and laws are updated by the New Mexico Regulation and Licensing Department (NM RLD). The NM RLD maintains a state-level board to advise on the changes of rules and regulations for occupational therapy.

Acknowledgements: This article was heavily influenced by an informative and timely presentation by Sarah Porte, MOT, OT/L at the 2022 NMOTA Annual Conference. Sarah has served the occupational therapy profession in many ways (including past leadership on the NMOTA Board) and currently serves on the New Mexico Rules and Laws - Occupational Therapy Board by appointment of the Governor. Thank you Sarah for your leadership to our profession!

The Rules and Laws were updated on 2/15/2022 by the NM RLD Board. There are numerous changes about which the OT community should be aware. This article will list some of the larger changes related to CEUs and supervision. However - every OT and OTA should read through the document to stay current with the rules and regulations in NM. The link to the updated rules and laws is at the end of this article. Here is a list of specific updates that may be of interest to NMOTA membership.

Occupational Therapy and Occupational Therapy Licensing Updates:

- The specific list of criminal offenses that may result in a license being denied or suspended (16.15.2.9)
- The procedure and expectations for expedited licensure for military service members, spouses and veterans (16.15.2.19)

### Supervision Updates:

- A specific list of support services that may be completed by therapy techs is delineated tasks such as cleaning equipment, assisting in patient transport, clerical activities.... (16.15.3.7-I).
  - Specific language from Item B in standard is added (16.15.3.8-B): "Non-licensed personnel do not provide skilled occupational therapy services."
- The number of OTAs that an OT may supervise is indicated (16.15.3.8-A-5, 6)
  - First-year OTs are limited to supervising three or fewer OTAs.
  - OTs with more than one year of experience must determine the number of OTAs that can be appropriately supervised depending on: "...the experience of the occupational therapy assistant, complexity of the patient or client needs and the setting of care."



# State-Level Changes to the Rules and Laws for Occupational Therapy

Continuing Education Requirement Updates:

- Fifteen Continuing Education Contact (CEUs) hours are required each year (16.15.4.8).
- The full list of ways to earn CEUs is important for all OTs and OTAs to know (16.15.4.9). Specific changes are listed below but reviewing the full list in the standard may help OTs and OTAs strategically consider which ways will provide the most benefit to their practices.
  - $\circ\,$  Changes to the limits to some types of CEUs are updated:
    - There is no limit to the number of books that may be used to acquire CEUs (provide a name of the book, number of pages and how the book relates to your OT practice area). Two CEUs may be obtained for each book.
    - There is no limit to the number of CEUs from audio or visual media

No changes were made to the general provision, disciplinary proceedings or fee schedule portions of the rules and laws with the 2022 updates.
